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Course Description

This course focuses on the theoretical and conceptual basis for nursing management of adult clients experiencing acute and chronic illness. The impact of social, cultural, psychological, physical, and spiritual factors on clients' health will be explored. It enables the students to develop assessment, critical thinking, and decision making skills required for planning and implementing the appropriate nursing care to clients suffering a wide variety of commonly presenting acute and chronic illness.

Course Objectives

After completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1- Identify the acute and chronic health problems that affect the adult clients in the Jordanian community
- 2- Identify strategies related to assessment and prevention of chronic illness.
- **3-** Identify nursing interventions related to a variety of health problems in the adult client suffering from a chronic illness
- 4- Describe therapeutic approaches for symptom management in clients experiencing chronic illness.
- 5- Describe methods to evaluate nursing interventions designed to maintain or promote a client safety
- 6- Describe methods of prevention and early detection used to obtain and maintain health in client at risk for development of acute or chronic

7- Identify client and family teaching needs to provide optimal safe care

8- Identify community recourse available to assist client and families in
dealing with acute or chronic health care problems after discharge
from hospital.
9- Discuss the role of the nurse in caring for the acute and chronically ill
adult clients.
10- Utilize the nursing process in meeting the physiological and
psychological needs of adult client with acute and chronic health
problems /alterations.
11- Apply Knowledge and selected concepts related to acute and chronic
illness from nursing sciences and the humanities.
12- Analyze the impact of chronic illness on the client and their families
from social psychological, physical, spiritual, and economic
perspectives.
13- Explore the importance of families and other social supports in
chronic illness.
14- Critically analyze ethical issues related to the care of the adult client
suffering from a chronic illness.
15- Identify research questions that remain unanswered in the area of
chronic illness.
16- Develop individualized care plans for client with acute and chronic
health problems based on the identified nursing diagnoses.
17- Formulate goals and outcome criteria for evaluating the effectiveness
of nursing intervention.
18- Develop teaching plans for client and families in order to provide
optimum care for client with acute and chronic health problems.
19- Utilize critical thinking process and decision making skills in the care
of the patient with acute and chronic illness.
20- Incorporate ethical, legal, and professional standards needed for
nursing acre of adult individuals with acute and chronic illnesses.

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Course Policies:

Should be explained to students at the first meeting:

1. Class Attendance:

Attendance is required in lecture and control lab. See attendance policy in student handbook. You are expected to remain in attendance during lecture time and control lab.
