Course module description:

This course is a 3-credit hour course. Classes will be help in Hall 405 in School of Pharmacy on Sundays and Tuesdays 3:00-4:30. It is intended to introduce pharmacy students to the basic concepts of patient counseling in a community pharmacy setting. The course will focus on topics that are commonly dealt with the community pharmacy.

Course module objectives:

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

- 1. Provide effective counseling to patients on prescription medications, for both acute and chronic illnesses.
- 2. Provide effective clinical information to patients who present to the pharmacy for medications and supplements that can be dispensed without a prescription.
- 3. Identify red flags in patients who seek help from the pharmacist in the community pharmacy setting, and refer them to the physician.

Teaching methods:

The course depends on providing information through class slides and group discussions or specific cases in pediatric care, pain management, and geriatric care. Class homework will given on a biweekly basis.

Learning outcomes:

• Knowledge and understanding

The course is focused on the main counseling points on prescription and OTC medications. There is strong focus on drug-drug interactions.

• Cognitive skills (thinking and analysis).

Cases regarding the main topics are presented and discussed in class with roleplay to demonstrate how counseling should be performed.

• Communication skills (personal and academic).

The course focuses on verbal communication skills that the pharmacist can utilize in providing information to the patient and encouraging compliance on medictions.

Practical and subject specific skills (Transferable Skills).
 Practices that can be used to ensure patient privacy and patient understanding of the information provided by the pharmacist.
